Within History of Art modules, students assess art across a broad sweep of cultures, periods, and forms: from ancient, medieval	

			<p>and Renaissance works through modern and contemporary art; and from a global perspective: artworks from Europe and America, Africa, Asia, and the Pacific. Within History modules, students develop specialised knowledge of the ways in which national histories are written and produced more widely, and how different social, cultural and ethnic groups and represented within those histories. The programme entails both multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches, and students consider the ways in which art works can be assessed as historical texts. Students are encouraged to think and work independently, and to engage with debates at the forefront of humanities research. Students take a wide range of modules in each discipline, and are taught discipline specific skills and methodologies via a variety of formative exercises and summative written assessment. Employability is built into the curriculum at every level via core and/or discipline specific modules, and employability events are also held.</p>

Our programme equips students with the key critical skills identified by the History benchmarking statement, namely the ability to read primary and other sources “both critically and empathetically”. The programme allows students to develop “the ability to ask and answer cogent and focused questions about the past and to pursue these questions through structured enquiry, selecting and interrogating an appropriate range of materials, including archival and historiographical sources of evidence” whose importance is outlined by the History benchmark statement. The History of Art benchmarking statement</p>			

		<p>emphasises the importance of studying both “what artists and designers did” and “why they did it”, and the programme’s focus upon “influence, inspiration and creativity” engages directly with the “historical, cultural and personal conditions which shape the production, use and valuing of artefacts”, and the “ways in which such artefacts have been subsequently interpreted and treated”. You will also develop the skills of archival and visual analysis essential to the proper study of the past.</p> <p>This degree will therefore provide you with a wide-ranging and rigorous understanding of past lives and cultures, as they have been interpreted by historians and art historians alike. Modules in art history include opportunities to study works of art and artefacts first-hand in the Sainsbury Centre for Visual Arts.</p> <p>Throughout your course, you will study the two disciplines of history and history of art in parallel, taking modules offered by both departments. 	<p>you will examine art as it has been practised in Europe and North America, as well as Asia, Africa, South America and the Pacific, from the prehistoric period through to the present day. In your historical studies you will engage with European, American and Russian history over a wide-ranging chronological span.
