The Leathes Prior Prize

This annual Prize is awarded for the best crowdfunding pitch and is open to students registered on the MSc Enterprise and Business Creation.

1. A Prize will be awarded annually in the Norwich Business School, and is open to students registered on the MSc Enterprise and Business Creation.
2. The value of the Prize will be £1,000 split equally between the winning pitch and a one-two hour consultation with Leathes Prior LLP (this could be around IP/Corporate/Commercial/data protection/commercial property/employment depending on the business needs of those awarded the prize).
3. The Prize will be awarded for the best crowdfunding pitch.
4. The Prize will be awarded on the recommendation of a Prize Committee appointed by the Head of School.
5. The Prize may not be divided and will be awarded to one team only.
6. If no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit, the Prize will not be awarded and will instead be carried forward for the next year.
7. The recipient agrees that their crowdfunding pitch may be promoted by Leathes Prior on their website in relation to their support of the prize.

Pharmacy Prizes

Mundipharma Research Life Sciences Prize

This prize of £50 is awarded annually to the Pharmacy student who achieves the best overall performance across the year, excluding the Pharmacy Practice module. The prize is open to Year 1 MPharm students.

Rules

1. A prize, to the value of £50, is awarded annually in the School of Pharmacy for the best overall performance across the year (excluding the Pharmacy Practice module).
2. The prize shall be awarded by the Board of the School on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners concerned.
3. If in any year no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit, the prize shall not be awarded. If two or more candidates are judged to be of sufficient and equal merit the prize may be divided.

Day Lewis Pharmacy Practice Prize for Year 2

1. A prize, to the value of £250, is awarded annually in the School of Pharmacy for outstanding performance in the Professional Pharmacy module(s).
2. The prize shall be awarded by the Board of the School on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners concerned.
3. If in any year no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit, the prize shall not be awarded. If two or more candidates are judged to be of sufficient and equal merit the prize may be divided.

Day Lewis Prize

1. A prize, to the value of £250, is awarded annually in the School of Pharmacy for the best performance in the Clinical Therapeutics modules.
2. The prize shall be awarded by the Board of the School on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners concerned.
3. If in any year no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit, the prize shall not be awarded. If two or more candidates are judged to be of sufficient and equal merit the prize may be divided.

British Pharmacological Society Prize

This prize of £100 is awarded annually to the Pharmacy student who achieves the best performance in Level 5 (Year 2) of the MPharm in the Neurophysiology, Synaptic Pharmacology and Endocrinology module.

Rules

A prize, to the value of £100, is awarded annually to the Pharmacy student who achieves the best performance in Level 5 (Year 2) of the MPharm in the Neurophysiology, Synaptic Pharmacology and Endocrinology module.

1. The prize shall be awarded by the Board of the School on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners concerned.
2. If in any year no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit, the prize shall not be awarded. If two or more candidates are judged to be of sufficient and equal merit the prize may be divided.

Chemistry Prizes

The Oxford University Press Prize

Rules

1. A prize, being books to the value of £150, to be awarded to the undergraduate student registered on a BSc or MChem programme in the School of Chemistry whom the Board of Examiners judges to have shown the most academic improvement during the course of the academic year.

The Norman Sheppard Prize for the outstanding undergraduate research project in Physical Chemistry in the final assessment at MChem

An annual prize of £200 is awarded for the outstanding undergraduate research project in Physical Chemistry in the Final Assessment at MChem.

Rules

A prize to the value of £200 for the outstanding undergraduate research project in Physical Chemistry in the Final Assessment at MChem.

1. The prize shall be awarded by the Board of the School on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners concerned.
2. If in any year no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit for a particular prize, the prize shall not be awarded. If two candidates for a prize are judged to be of equal merit then that prize may be divided.

The Lord Walston Scholarship

The Lord Walston Scholarship is awarded to a Postgraduate student within the School of International Development to enable them to undertake a Master's degree at UEA.

Eligibility

1. To be eligible for this Scholarship, applicants must:
 - a. Have applied for and accepted a place on any of the following Postgraduate Taught degree courses in the School of International Development:
 - i. MA Agriculture and Rural Development
 - ii. MSc Climate Change and International Development
 - iii. MSc Environment and International Development
 - b. Be from Africa and plan to pursue a career in Africa.
 - c. Have met the English Language requirement.

Value of award

2. The Scholarship is worth an amount up to the value of the interest in the endowment. It is awarded towards the recipient's tuition fees and living and travel expenses.

Selection process

3. The Scholarship is awarded by a Selection Panel whose decision is final.
4. The recipient will be chosen on the basis of:
 - a. Academic history

Scholarship terms

5. The Scholarship is payable after the recipient has completed the University's registration process.
6. If two or more candidates are deemed to be of equal merit, the Scholarship will not be divided.
7. If no candidate is judged to be of sufficient merit, the Scholarship will not be awarded.
8. No person will be awarded the Scholarship more than once.
9. The Scholarship is subject to terms and conditions which must be formally agreed to by the recipient before the award is made.

Application Process:

All eligible candidates will be considered for the scholarship.

Selection Process:

ARM Postgraduate Admissions are responsible for shortlisting for the scholarships, then the shortlisted applications are sent to a panel or academic within the School of International Development.

Funding and Finance:

One scholarship is available every three years.

The School of International Development may choose to part-fund the scholarship, if funds from the endowment are insufficient. This will be arranged between Gina Neff, Penny Joy and The Development Office.
